
Using voice to support piano teaching

- From the very beginning, piano lessons should be filled with singing
- Singing is the most natural thing in the world





- Singing is a valuable tool for children's learning which aids in language development, memory, social interaction and emotional well-being
- For children learning an instrument, it enhances their musical understanding , improves their memory and fosters a love of music
- Singing promotes creativity, boosts self-confidence
- Singing enhances cognitive skills





"You must sing if you want to play" Chopin



 Chopin encouraged students to play with a singing tone and to listen to great singers to improve expression and legato line

• Liszt had his students learn how to make melodies sing by studying Italian opera



CPE Bach. "you must be able to hum your pieces without the piano"

Schumann advises students to be able to sing at sight without the aid of an instrument to improve the sharpness of their hearing.

Rubinstein made his piano students learn to sing because he believed that one is not a musician if you can't sing.

Toscanini "Instrumentalists can best interpret a work if they sing it to themselves first"

Leon Fischer (pianist) "I highly recommend singing everything that you play"



Singing trains the musical ear by helping students grasp musical concepts like pitch, rhythm and phrasing.



- It develops the student's ability to internalize and reproduce melodies.
 - Use Solfège and Kodály rhythm syllables



Singing while playing piano encourages musicality and artistry



• Students also learn to play lyrically and emotionally



Teachers can sing with their pupils to create beautiful music



- Tactile sensitivity
- Sing with the melodic line (phrase) and "breathe" from the wrist
- Sing articulations for accuracy using syllables or rhythm names



Singing as a memory aid

- Tactile memory
- Singing when learning a new piece helps with memory of melody and rhythm
- Listen to a recording of new piece (or YouTube) and sing along with the melody
- Sing challenging sections by phrase before playing





Sight singing for piano students:



- Develops ear
- Can improve ability to connect music reading to playing
- Singing with Solfège helps internalize intervals
